There have been far too many of our Black brothers and sisters that have been wrongly incarcerated or murdered at the hands of those with racist/anti-black ideals. UT FSA has been building its platform for over 30 years and has many ties within the 40 acres along with connections to other FSAs in Texas. We want to use the platform that we have been given to help the movement in any way that we can. Each individual organization can set their maximum matching limit to whatever they see is most comfortable for them financially, we do not want to force everyone to do up to \$1000 if it is not within the financial abilities of the organization.
